## 1.1 Introduction

SDG1 aims to end poverty in all its forms everywhere. The World Bank revised poverty estimates revealed that the international poverty line increased from 2.17 to 3.00, putting 808 million people under extreme poverty, an increase of 131 million from the previous estimate (16% increase). As an institute, Karunya Institute of Technology and Sciences aims to contribute towards "No Poverty" through its various wings such as education for the low-income group, research, social awareness and healthcare. A university with a well-focused and structured program, it aims to inch towards zero poverty with dedication and sincerity.

### **Low-Income Students Receiving Financial Aid**

Being a premier institute, Karunya provides quality education to all income groups of all states through its national and global tie-ups and opens doors to the less privileged students. It provides an ambient atmosphere where students learn together, creating an amiable situation for the underprivileged to share their ideas and equip themselves without the burden of tuition fees. Below is the list of students availing scholarship for the year 2023-24.

KITS provides financial assistance to low-income students, empowering them with education and employment opportunities. This fellowship encourages bright young minds to achieve academic excellence and grow into contributing members of society.

Total of 990 students benefited by scholarships and free ships provided by the institution, Government and non-government agencies (NGOs) of 15000 USD during the year (other than the students receiving scholarships under the government schemes for reserved categories) is listed below.

### 1.3 University Anti-Poverty Programmes

Karunya Institute of Technology and Sciences works to lower enrollment barriers and implements policies so that all students, regardless of background or financial status, can receive a top-notch education.

### **Bottom Financial Quintile Admission Target**

All students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds who enrol in KITS are assisted in securing bank loans to complete their degree.

### **Bottom Financial Quintile Student Success**

Ninety-five per cent of the financially aided students enrolled at the university graduate within the specified period. In 2024, 2042 numbers of students successfully graduated, out of which 1560 are UG students, 402 are PG students, and 80 students are PhD scholars.

### **Low-Income Student Support**

To alleviate the financial burden of economically disadvantaged students and ensure that they study without interruption, a range of student aid measures are offered to them. These initiatives include student loans, first-girl child scholarships for low-income students, study grants for first-generation students, reduced tuition or waived fees for students enrolled under sports quota, and a variety of state and private scholarship schemes. Additionally, the institution waives 50% of the fees if the breadwinner of the family passes away accidentally during the course of the study period.

### **Bottom Financial Quintile Student Support**

KITS welcomes students from all backgrounds, including those facing economic challenges. While it does not restrict admission based on financial status, the institution actively supports socially and economically disadvantaged students in applying for various government scholarships—such as SC/ST, Merit, Northeast, Women's, and Sports Scholarships—for those with an annual family income of ₹2 lakh or below.

### **1.4 Community Anti-Poverty Programmes**

To fulfil the objectives of community anti-poverty initiatives, KITS offers services to support economically impoverished residents of nearby villages. Additionally, it offers several training programmes to people who wish to enhance their skill sets and become entrepreneurs to achieve the community anti-poverty program goals.

### **Programmes for Services Access**

Several university-level initiatives aimed at alleviating poverty for the local population include sensitization programmes on two-wheeler engine assembly, tuition centres, 3D printing, medical camp; eye-checkup camp, sensitisation program on field practices in masonry, bar bending for local community, Manipur relief project, health and hygiene hand-wash campaign which are listed below in brief.

### **Tuition Centers**

As vulnerable communities are living near Karunya University, the Centre for Community Academia and Collaborations (CCAC) renders its helping hand on behalf of the institution. The CCAC division is running 14 free Tuition Centres in the 14 vulnerable areas. The students of the downtrodden and tribal communities benefited and received school kits, whiteboard sets, mats, and a few playing kits to use their leisure time.

### **Medical & Eye-Checkup Camps**

Despite rain and power outages, Karunya Hospitals, in collaboration with Karunya Community Academia, successfully held a medical camp at Sadivayal, a remote tribal village near the elephant corridor. With unwavering dedication, the team of Karunya provided essential healthcare services to 23 community members, offering free haemoglobin, blood sugar, and blood pressure screenings, along with free medicine and doctor consultations.





### **Health and Hygiene Campaign**

To create awareness among the rural people about maintaining cleanliness in their living area, a cleanliness campaign was organised at Perumal Kovil Pathi Village. The students were categorised into different units. Each unit was divided into groups of five. For each group, a target of more than 2kg of waste was fixed. Students all walked along the roads near the lake and collected the waste with suitable prevention methods. Masks and gloves were given to every student, and a plastic bag for each group.
